Rosa Parks was born in Tuskegee, Alabama, on February 4, 1913

she was among only one other sibling, her brother Sylvester McCauley. Rosa Parks, knew from an early age that she was not free. Rosa learned of the hatred from the Ku Klux Klan, white men that wore cone shaped hoods, and rode around through African-American communities, burning churches, beating people and also sometimes killing them too. Rosa's life as an African-American was hard on her and her family. When Rosa was in Montgomery she experienced the Jim Crow Segregation laws, that were enforced to keep blacks and whites separate.
